Education for Your Deaf/Hard of Hearing (D/HH) Child

- There are several different ways to approach how schooling will look for your child with hearing loss that include supports that can be built into the child's individualized education plan (IEP) or 504 plan for school. The IEP or 504 is made to your child's unique communication needs and is goal focused to help your child succeed.
- There are some school districts that have a deaf education unit, where the students are grouped together with other children who are deaf or hard of hearing.
- Some families choose to send their child to a mainstream public school and develop supports within the school to help the child learn.
- Kentucky School for the Deaf (KSD) provides education and support services to deaf and hard of hearing students across the state for ages 6-21.

- There are options to have the child taught in American Sign Language (ASL), Signed Exact English (SEE), Listening and Spoken Language (LSL), etc. or using a combination of any of the child's chosen communication methods.
- KSD offers a program that supports both schools and parents, called KSD Outreach. In this you have access to a person that works with the part of the state you live in and knows how to help you navigate what to ask for and what you need to get your child through school.
