

I am pleased to present the inaugural report on the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP). The pilot program was established through the enactment of Senate Bill 90 in 2022. The legislation also tasked the Administrative Office of the Courts with collecting data from treatment providers and prosecutors regarding participants' progress through BHCDP and providing an annual report to the General Assembly.

The program's implementation commenced in 2023 with the initial launch in Letcher County. Expansion to other counties continues. It will be implemented in the final county, Greenup, in February 2024.

BHCDP aims to enhance treatment access for justice-involved individuals, providing an alternative to incarceration. Eligible defendants, based on qualifying charges and behavioral health needs, can receive an array of services including outpatient, inpatient, and residential treatment; medications for opioid use disorder; case management; and educational and vocational support. Successful completion of the program results in the dismissal of all charges against the defendant.

As you will see from some of the participants' stories highlighted in this report, this program has provided them with not only treatment for their disorders but also valuable job training and educational support. Additionally, the case management services offered by our providers have eliminated barriers and aided participants in reclaiming control of their lives.

The initial stages of the project have proven the program's success in making a difference in the lives of the participants. Now that a solid foundation has been built for the program, our data collection and reporting indicate we will continue to have promising outcomes.

In 2023, 1,538 defendants were determined by the AOC Department of Pretrial Services to be eligible for the program. Out of that figure, 189 defendants voluntarily participated in the program. As of the publication of this report, 25 have completed the program and 13 have been discharged for noncompliance or withdrawn from the program.

This report is a snapshot of the initial year of the program, and I hope you benefit from the information provided.

I am honored to present the data collected during the initial implementation of Senate Bill 90. Under SB 90, the AOC is responsible for compiling information from its Department of Pretrial Services, prosecutors, treatment providers and Kentucky Adult Education to track an array of data, including eligibility exclusions, participant demographics, housing, education and treatment modalities. The annual report presents comprehensive totals and breakdowns by pilot site.

We anticipate that the data collected will shed light on how early interventions can positively impact lives. Please share the report with your colleagues, constituents and other interested parties in your communities. We appreciate your support of the goals of SB 90 and your commitment to aiding some of Kentucky's most vulnerable citizens.

Overview

Senate Bill 90 (SB 90), co-sponsored by Senator Whitney Westerfield, President Robert Stivers, and Senator Brandon Storm, was signed into law by Governor Beshear on April 20, 2022, and created the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP) pilot program. BHCDP aims to divert defendants charged with certain non-violent, non-sexual misdemeanors and Class D felonies away from jail and into treatment for substance use and/or mental health disorders.


The goal of BHCDP is to eliminate the barriers of addiction and to expand access to treatment. The legislation provides an alternative to incarceration by allowing eligible defendants to receive treatment for substance abuse and/or a behavioral health disorder. Under this legislation, eligible defendants must be assessed as soon as possible (but within at least 72 hours, if incarcerated) by a qualified mental health professional who will ascertain the presence of a behavioral health disorder. If the defendant is determined to be eligible for BHCDP, the pros-

ecutor can enter into an agreement with the defendant to participate in this program.

BHCDP includes an array of services, such as: outpatient or inpatient treatment; cognitive and behavioral therapies; education; vocational services; and, housing assistance. Funding for behavioral health treatment is either by the defendant's current health insurance (which includes Medicaid) or the Opioid Abatement Trust Fund (if the defendant is uninsured), which is administered by the Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities (DBHDID).

Eleven sites were selected to pilot BHCDP: Christian, Clark, Daviess, Greenup, Hopkins, Kenton, Letcher, Madison, McCracken, Oldham and Pulaski counties. These counties were selected based on the following criteria: operation of a county jail; availability of community and court-based behavioral health programs; historical data pertaining to individuals' eligibility for participation; initial interest by counties expressing desire to participate; and, consideration of equal representation of each Supreme Court District.

I am exceedingly honored to Chair the SB90 BHCDP Advisory Council and work alongside the dedicated state and local leaders to make transformational changes to all struggling justice-involved Kentuckians, getting them out of the system, provide them with services such as outpatient and inpatient treatment, medications for addiction and mental health treatment, case management, educational and job training, and recovery supports.

If the participant adheres to and completes the treatment plan outlined by a behavioral health provider, their charges will be dropped, changing the trajectory of their lives. It is my belief that provider services and intervention shortly after arrest will lead to healthier outcomes for the participant and the Commonwealth as a whole.

Kentucky has increased the number of treatment beds by 50%, we are working to designated communities as "Recovery Ready" ensuring the necessary tools are readily available, the

Office of Drug Control continues to annually award almost \$6 million to assist pregnant and parenting women fighting addiction and every year increases the distribution of Narcan. We have worked with thousands of employers on hiring and retaining those in recovery. This not only reduces the burden of addiction for those struggling, but it also boosts workforce participation, reduces crime and keeps Kentucky families intact.

Our continued work through SB 90's BHCDP is a critical part of our overall work of offering individuals an alternative to incarceration, increasing opportunities for treatment, creating a better, safer Kentucky through second chances.

Implementation Council

BHCDP created an Implementation Council, mandating it meet quarterly to assist with implementation efforts. Per SB 90, the Implementation Council shall:

- (a) Oversee the implementation of the behavioral health conditional dismissal program pilot project;
- (b) Review the data collected by the Administrative Office of the Courts and report to the Interim Joint Committee on Judiciary and the Governor by October 1 of each year of the pilot project regarding:

- Recommendations for any additional performance measures needed to promote the success of the program;
- 2. Whether any action is necessary, including funding or legislation;
- 3. Recommendations for resolving any matters that reduce the effectiveness of the program; and
- 4. Any additional information the council deems appropriate.



Workgroups

The Implementation Council meetings began August 11, 2022, where members began the exploration stage of implementation. Workgroups were quickly formed to facilitate discussions on process mapping and building effective tools to capture data requirements within the legislation.

The Courts and Data Workgroup was created to assess data mapping and collection, court process mapping, and development of the case



The Department of Public Advocacy (DPA) is honored to be working with the SB 90 Implementation Council to develop and

expand the vitally important Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program. In my three decades as a public defender, I have repeatedly seen the negative impact on communities, individuals, and families when the criminal justice system offers only incarceration and the debilinavigator role. They also worked on how best to collect data from prosecutors, treatment providers, and the AOC data reporting process, as well as review of third-party data applications to create a data platform.

The *Treatment and Recovery Workgroup* took charge of assessment process, assessor selection, treatment provider application process and eligibility, acceptable services available for funding, and coordination with Medicaid for assessments and providers.

Finally, the *Education and Training Workgroup* was tasked with coordinating across education, vocational, and workforce development agencies (to work with local adult education providers and key stakeholders within pilot sites), developing a process map and decision support template, exploring federal funding options, education/work needs assessment process, and developing an employer registry.

Together the workgroups were able to create steps on how the BHCDP will best operate in pilot sites, with the supports and mechanisms necessary for programmatic success.

tating effects of a criminal record, rather than solutions that will improve lives and keep communities safe.

The BHCDP promises a new direction that is focused on making tomorrow better while still holding individuals accountable for their actions yesterday. When people get the help and support they need to battle their mental health and substance use challenges, all of society benefits. DPA is committed to the success of this important program and looks forward to its continuation and expansion.

Community Forums

The next stage of implementation efforts: community forums in the pilot sites. Equipped with process maps, flow charts, and data analysis, AOC in conjunction with DBHDID and

Kentucky Adult Education (KYAE) spearheaded local community forums in the pilot counties beginning September 28, 2022, in Kenton County.

Over the course of October, November, and December of 2022, the remaining community forums took place giving local stakeholders attorneys, prosecutors, (judges, clerks, law enforcement officers, jailers, treatment providers, AOC staff) a floor to ask questions and a voice to shape implementation in their counties. The community forums offered insight to the Implementation Council on how to enhance future process mapping and how to better offer support to local stakeholders. The local community

forum attendees also expressed a

concern for who was going to navigate the participant through the SB 90 process. These insights and concerns led to the creation of a new position for case navigators.

Case navigators, under the umbrella of Pretrial Services, provide coordination of services and ensure adequate support is offered to the participant throughout the process. They bridge the gap in the referral process by contacting eligible defendants and ensuring that the clinical assessment is complete to establish eligibility. The case navigator also works collaboratively with local courts, prosecutors, defense counsel, and other community stakeholders to


> assist participants in navigating the court process. Case navigators attend court regularly and are responsible for providing technical support at the local level.

While funding was still being established and process mapping and new support features were being revised and/or created, the Letcher County community was eager to begin implementation.

BHCDP implementation began in Letcher County on January 1, 2023. Pretrial Services also began on this date to collect eligibility data for all potential participants in all 11 pilot counties as required by the legislation.

With assistance of continued local

stakeholder meetings involving Pretrial Services, DBHDID, KYAE, and treatment providers, operating procedures were established for Letcher County. The first participant to sign the Agreement to Participate and officially enter the program occurred on February 1st, 2023. Operations slowly became streamlined, producing a pathway to replicate in other counties, but still accommodate local court procedures.



The Implementation Council workgroups continued to meet to secure supports and solidify the technical aspects of SB 90, such as creating the statewide assessor to conduct the initial clinical assessments for determining eligibility and establishing contracts for the creation of a data collection platform.

In May 2023, the Implementation Council voted on the schedule for the next phase of implementation, to begin in July 2023 with Clark and Madison counties. A second round of community forums was conducted to distribute updated process maps, review a framework of operations, and explain how stakeholders will receive support from local case navigators. Over the course of August to December, community forums and official launch dates were held in Pulaski, Hopkins, Christian, Oldham, and McCracken Counties. During this period, the data platform became ready for use and the mechanisms for accessing barrier relief funds entered its final stages for approval.

As evidenced by the community forums and the beginning stages of implementation, community response to implementation of SB 90 in these jurisdictions has been enormous and impressive. The courts have long known that behavioral health issues have plagued its defendants and while understanding the need to help these individuals is high, there have not always been mechanisms or funding available to get them the help they needed. SB 90 has created a safe space for defendants to seek behavioral health treatment and incentivize early intervention with partnerships with the courts, treatment providers, and KYAE. It also pro-

vides much needed wrap around services to ensure the success of the participants throughout the program by eliminating barriers that might impede rehabilitation. Even now, with SB 90's available funding, local community partners have been active with their assistance for participants in need.

The final three pilot sites, Greenup, Daviess, and Kenton are gearing up for the next steps in implementation and are scheduled for community forums in January of 2024. This annual report is a documentation of the journey into the first year of BHCDP's pilot across the commonwealth, consistent with statutory requirements, not only highlighting the successes of the program but also highlighting potential areas of improvement for the future.

SB 90 Overview by County

Letcher County Implementation January 1, 2023

Letcher County was the first pilot county in the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP).

"SB90 has gave me my family back. My life, my freedom. I am not a prisoner of my life anymore. I wake up each day refreshed and happy. I look forward to the day. It's gave me a purpose to move forward to get my GED, my peer support certificate, get a job with MCCC someday soon so I can reach out and help others like I've been helped with a new future, a new life. I was headed back to prison but thanks to this program now headed to a future. I got another chance to be a person living on life's terms to be a mother to my children. "There are many reasons that I commonly refer to Kentucky's Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program/SB 90 as 'the best thing since sliced bread.' I use this phrase as the utmost compliment and to express my enthusiasm with the program.

The first reason that I believe that SB 90 is so novel is that it focuses on low risk offenders. While I initially believed that the risk level needed to be elevated I soon realized that there was a whole group of justice-involved individuals that we had overlooked in the past who may be in crisis and need assistance.

Secondly, in reflection, it appears that in the past that we simply treated the symptoms of substance use disorders without truly trying to figure out the cause. My adding the behavioral health component, SB 90 has caused us to dig a little deeper and try to address the underlying cause of the problem.

Finally, SB 90 has provided an essential tool and resource for those seeking recovery in the form of Case Navigators which are stationed at the various courthouses. These Case Navigators have proven invaluable in helping justice involved individuals 'navigate treatment', the legal world, and the real world.

These practical differences as to what we have done in the past has shown extraordinary dividends in helping people address many behavioral health concerns or substance use disorders which for most was the cause of their involvement in the criminal justice system." Clark Implementation July 16, 2023

Pretrial eligible defendants to enter: 2 Prosecutorial overrides to enter: 10

"The work I do for SB 90 never feels like 'work'. They say if you love what you do, you won't work a day in your life! I couldn't agree more. I feel blessed to be able to help these individuals on a level they feel they have never been helped before. I can't count the number of times someone has thanked me simply for listening to them and being there for

them...something that seems that it should be a given. Although we do much more as navigators than listening and being there for participants, that aspect of what we do is so important. I am seeing lives change before my eyes. People who have never given sobriety a chance, are now over 100 days sober and counting. People who may have been dealing with anxiety/depression are learning coping skills and can't believe the improvements they are seeing in their daily lives. People are pursing education that they never thought they would have access to or be able to afford. I could go on with numerous examples. SB 90 is saving and improving lives!" "As a Public Defender for more than 20 years, I have come to realize that many of my clients have suffered from untreated mental health disorders and substance abuse disorders. 



Interviews Receiving BHCDP Eligibility Assessment by PSA Score




Interviews Assessed PSA Low/Low Receiving BHCDP Eligibility Assessment




Pretrial Interviews Assessed for BHCDP Eligibility 1/2/2023-12/31/2023

Interviews Receiving BHCDP Eligibility Assessment by Race




Interviews Receiving BHCDP Eligibility Assessment by Gender




BHCDP Referrals to Clinical Assessment 1/2/2023-12/31/2023

BHCDP is a voluntary program. The following chart indicates the percentage of referrals which resulted in a completed clinical assessment by Referral Source and County. A count of referrals does not equate to a count of individuals, as an individual can have multiple referrals over the course of the program.




Clinical assessment results indicate that most potential participants have co-occurring disorders. Out of all the assessments completed, only 7 showed no indication of a Mental Health or Substance Use Disorder, which made them ineligible for BHCDP.




Demographic Data for BHCDP Referrals 1/2/2023-12/31/2023

BHCDP Referrals from Pretrial Services




BHCDP Referrals from Prosecutors

BHCDP Accepted into Program






BHCDP Eligibility—DUI and IPV Offense Details

Interviews 1/2/2023 to 12/31/2023 with BHCDP Eligibility Assessment Excluding Unknown Eligibility


Question Four: Is the defendant charged with DUI offense under KRS 189A.010?



Interviews 1/2/2023 to 12/31/2023 with BHCDP Eligibility Assessment Excluding Unknown Eligibility








BHCDP Participant Responses to 42-day Progress Reports Completed CY 2023

Data collected 42 days after the participants entered into treatment indicates the following: Out of the 126 participants who had a completed 14-day report, 52 had a completed 42-day report indicating their progression in the program. The other participants either had not reached their 42-day report period as of the date of this publication, or they were discharged from the program prior to the 42-day mark.

No major differences were noted from the 14-day report metrics. For instance, 25% of participants were still in unstable housing and about 50% were unemployed. Though not a significant amount there were a few instances of participants' level of care decreasing for mental health treatment while level of care for substance use treatments stayed consistent. The most commonly identified case management needs were employment services, housing supports, transportation coordination, and family services.

The Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities is honored to contribute leadership to the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program. This past year represented tangible system transformation leading to life-altering impact for Kentuckians. Alongside vital state and community partners, pathways between community agencies are being cultivated, partnerships are deepening, and gaps in the system of care are being mended. The collective work is guided by the value that community-based services, as an alternative to incarceration, support recovery while also breaking the cycle of criminal-legal involvement.

The Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program is part of a larger movement to improve the continuum of care for Kentuckians with mental health problems, substance use disorders, and developmental and intellectual disabilities who disproportionately face criminal-legal involvement. The Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities is proud to contribute leadership on initiatives, including the Judicial Commission on Mental Health, primary prevention,

Office of Adult Education

John Gregory, Ph.D. Executive Director of the Office of Adult Education

The Lifelong Learning Branch within the Office of Adult Education (OAE) of the Kentucky Education and Labor Cabinet (ELC) is privileged to work with the Administra-

tive Office of the Courts (AOC) and the other partners across the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP) spectrum. The inaugural year of this four-year pilot has been very rewarding and the OAE looks forward to continued collaboration with AOC and the other stakeholders over the next three years.

The OAE recognizes the significance of providing Kentuckians the opportunity to receive treatment and the education and training necessary to overcome the throes of addiction; environmental challenges; and limited access to resources to create positive future outcomes for BHCDP participants. Kentuckians with qualifying offenses who participate in this program work with prosecuting and defense attorneys to defer charges against them until they successfully complete the program. In addition to treatment, educational, vocational, and recovery-housing support is integral to the sustainable success of each participant and the pilot program overall.

Kentucky has experienced a record low recidivism rate and the success of the BHCDP will contribute to an even lower rate as well as set the conditions for lifelong learning and sustainable success. The Lifelong Learning Branch within the Office of Adult Education and the Adult Education Local Provider network have been working diligently to change the trajectory of participants' lives, getting them to pursue education and training opportunities which include but are not limited to secondary-level academic instruction; adult education and family literacy activities; English language acquisition activities; integrated education and training activities; workforce preparation activities; workplace literacy activities; and transition to post-secondary education activities. The OAE in partnership with the Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS), Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities (DBHDID) developed a Training & Vocational Voucher Program to support BHCDP participants pursuing education and training opportunities. The OAE will leverage allotted BHCDP Trust Fund monies to support the administration and implementation of required program activities and to enhance capacity for program participants to overcome barriers to educational and vocational attainment.

The Office of Adult Education received 186 referrals via the BHCDP process in 2023; 52% of participants have completed the KYAE assessment requirement per KRS 533.286. Seventeen percent of the participants enrolled are in an adult education program, training or credentialing program, or post-secondary institution. Six percent of the participants received additional services, while 9% completed education, employment, or training programs. The OAE applauds the efforts and coordination of the AOC and the other partners during 2023 and anticipates greater levels of success in 2024 as it relates to education and training for participants.


Kentucky Adult Education (KYAE)

SECTION 9. A NEW SECTION OF KRS
CHAPTER 533 IS CREATED TO READ AS
FOLLOWS: (1) (a) The Office of Adult Education within the Department of Workforce Investment of the Education and Workforce Development Cabinet in conjunction with a community rehabilitation provider shall conduct an in-person initial screening of any individual participating in a behavioral health conditional dismissal program within thirty (30) days of a participant beginning the program under Section 4 of this Act

In 2023, Kentucky Adult Education received 186 educational referrals from treatment providers on behalf of BHCDP participants. Fifty-two percent of participants have completed their education assessment. Seventeen percent of participants (33) are currently receiving services through KYAE progressing after their educational assessment. Of the 48% of partici-

pants who have yet to complete their educational assessment, 16 of them are currently onhold (the participant may not be able to complete their assessment due to recommendation of treatment provider or have been discharged from BHCDP). KYAE has noted that 30% of participants (55) are overdue for their educational assessment for which staff are working to get completed. Seventeen percent of participants (31) refused any services recommended after their initial education screening. Nine percent of participants (17) have completed recommended services from KYAE (Education, Employment, and Training) which includes Measurable Skill Gain (MSG), GED Enrollment, GED Attainment, IET (Integrated Education and Training)/WPL (Whole Person Learning). Six percent of participants (12) were referred to additional services for education success.

Participant Progress For Kentucky Adult Education Services




Final Report

The Final Report is compiled by the treatment provider and shall be filed no later than 30 days following the participant's completion or discharge from the program. In the first year of SB 90, there have 25 participants who have successfully completed BHCDP from Letcher, Clark, Hopkins, and Madison counties. The average length of agreement for the successful participants was three to six months working on their goals and through a variety of barriers.

There have been 13 participants who've been released from BHCDP, 2 withdrew from the program voluntarily and 11 were discharged due to non-compliance with treatment (all did not attend treatment). The average length of time these participants were in BHCDP before being released was about ten weeks. It is worth noting that two of the participants who were discharged due to non-compliance came to the program from prosecutor referrals not from statue definition of eligibility.

Pretrial Services reviewed the 25 successful participants' Kentucky criminal histories and NCICs and found all have remained arrest and conviction free as of 12/31/23.

The AOC anticipates that in 2024 there will be a larger collection of data from final reports as all eleven pilot sites will be active and as more agreements come to a conclusion.

^{*} Stable housing has been one of the top barriers for SB 90 participants across all active pilot sites. Stable housing does not just mean "a place to stay" but is further defined as safe, healthy housing for the participants without uncertainty about their housing situation and generally an ability to move if desired. Some participants have also faced barriers finding stable housing that will allow families, children, significant others, pets, or staying within their local community.

Statistics Request Description

On November 3, 2023, Research & Statistics received a request for a report detailing the specific current Driving Under the Influence (DUI) and Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) charges and prior convictions relevant to the assessments of eligibility for the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP) conducted by Pretrial Services.

Data from PRIM, the information system used by Pretrial Services, was queried for pretrial interviews created since 1/2/2023 that included a BHCDP Assessment. Information about charges in cases filed in BHCDP pilot counties related to these interviews was queried from the CourtNet database, which contains a summary of cases statewide. Convictions of charges ineligible for BHCDP prior to each pretrial interview against the same defendant were identified from cases in CourtNet with criminal history keys matching the defendants from the queried interviews.

Statistical Report (23_PINS8009)

The report consists of six pages. The first three pages pertain to DUI offenses and the last three pages pertain to IPV offenses.

DUI OFFENSES

The first page includes two bar charts and two cross-tabulations. The bar chart and table at the top of the page focus on BHCDP Eligibility Question 4 (Current DUI Charges) while the bar chart and table at the bottom of the page focus on Question 9 (Prior DUI Convictions). The charts and tables present eligibility information focused on each question with proportions grouped by Combined Risk Level.

The second page presents the same information about Question 4 along with additional information about the current DUI charges relevant to each pretrial interview, while the third page presents the same information about Question 9 along with additional information about each interview's defendant's prior DUI convictions.

A list of relevant DUI offenses is attached below. Since DUI Offenses are categorized in a hierarchy $(4^{th}+ Offense > 3^{rd} Offense > 2^{nd} Offense > 1^{st} Offense)$, each interview always has only a single DUI Offense Category for its current charges or prior convictions.

IPV OFFENSES

The fourth page of the report has the same structure as the first page but focuses on BHCDP Eligibility Questions 5 (Current IPV Charges) and 10 (Prior IPV Convictions). The fifth page provides the same information about Question 5 along with additional information about current IPV Charges, while the sixth page presents the same information about question 10 along with additional information about each interview's defendant's prior convictions of IPV offenses.

A list of queried IPV offenses is attached below. An interview may include offenses from one or more of the applicable categories at a time, meaning that the reported IPV Offense Categories are independent. The same interview may be counted for multiple categories as applicable but is only counted once for each subtotal or grand total. All counts represent counts of interviews and counts of distinct cases or charges are not provided in this report.

Statistical Analysis Considerations:

- > The statistics presented in the attached tables are a snapshot in time as of the date the data was queried/provided (1/8/2024).
- Prior convictions may only be identified among those included in the CourtNet database, which is limited to convictions in Kentucky State Courts. Convictions from other courts affect eligibility and are not identified in this report.
- > IPV offenses are identified as those that are overtly or frequently related to intimate partner violence. However, charges other than those identified in this report may be IPV-related, and some of the offenses reported may not always be IPV-related.



Glossary

Approved Treatment Providers

Approved assessors for each county participating in the pilot program established under Section 1 of this Act by Department of Behavior Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities (BHDID).

Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP)

Program designed to provide an eligible person who has a behavioral health disorder and who has been charged with a qualifying offense an alternative to receive treatment and recovery support services addressing the behavioral health disorder instead of incarceration, resulting in dismissal of the charges upon successful completion.

Agreement to Participate

Agreement to participate in BHCDP. Outlines provider chosen and length of the program.

Behavioral Health Disorder

A mental health disorder or substance use disorder, or both.

Behavioral Health Treatment Program

A plan or recovery program based upon a clinical assessment, that: (a) Identifies and incorporates recovery services to meet the specific treatment and recovery goals and the needs of the individual served; (b) Addresses the social determinants of health to include housing, transportation, access to medical care, meaningful employment; and (c) Considers a full continuum of care.

Carewise

Statewide approved qualified mental health professional that completes the initial assessment.

Case Navigator

Through the Department of Pretrial Services, the position of Case Navigator was created to bridge the referral process of individuals assessed by a mental health assessor, found to meet the criteria, and agreed to participate in the Behavior Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP).

Clinical Assessment

An assessment that is performed by a qualified mental health professional in accordance with the most recent American Society of Addiction Medicine criteria for substance use disorder, and the most recent edition of the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders for a mental health disorder.

Court Statistics Project (CSP)

An initiative of the Conference of State Court Administrators and the National Center for State Courts, the Court Statistics Project (CSP) is the only source for an annual national overview of comparable state court caseload data. The <u>State Court Guide to Statistical Reporting</u> can be found on their website under the Court Statistics tab. https://www.courtstatistics.org

DBHDID

Department of Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities

Eligible Defendant or Eligible Participant

An individual assessed by Pretrial Services as a low-risk, low-level offender or has been otherwise determined by the attorney for the Commonwealth or the attorney for the defendant as a viable participant in BHCDP. A clinical assessment performed by an approved mental health provider determines if the defendant is eligible/ineligible.

Final Report

Report due upon completion or removal from program due to non-compliance.

Findings of Initial Assessor

Report due upon completion of the clinical assessment. Provides recommended level of care and presence of mental health disorder, substance use disorder, co-occurring disorders, or none.

KYAE

Kentucky Adult Education

Mental Health Disorder

A diagnostic term that covers many clinical categories typically including behavioral or psychological symptoms, or both, along with impairment of personal and social function, and specifically defined and clinically interpreted though reference to criteria contained in the most recent edition of the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorder.

Opioid Abatement Trust Fund

The Kentucky Opioid Abatement Trust Fund is a trust and agency account established in the State Treasury to combat the opioid epidemic in Kentucky. The fund consists of 50% of all proceeds received by the Commonwealth, counties, consolidated local governments, urban-county governments, and

cities of the Commonwealth in opiate litigation. The fund is distributed as described in subsection (3) of KRS 15.293 and shall not be appropriated or transferred by the General Assembly for any other purposes.

Oualified Mental Health Professional

The same as in KRS 202A.011 and shall include a licensed clinical and alcohol and drug counselor under KRS Chapter 309.

Qualifying Offense

A misdemeanor or Class D felony that is not: (a) An offense that would qualify the person as a violent offender under KRS 439.3401; (b) A sex crime as defined by KRS 17.500; (c) An offense under KRS 189A.010; (d) An offense against a victim who has a protective order as defined in KRS 508.130 against the defendant at the time the offense is charged; (e) An act of domestic violence and abuse as defined in KRS 403.720, or an act of dating violence and abuse as defined in KRS 456.010, against the defendant at the time the offense is charged; or (f) An offense against a victim who has an interpersonal protective order issued under KRS 456.060;

Quarterly Report

Report due on January 15, April 15, July 15, and October 15 annually. Reports completed individually by qualified mental health provider, Commonwealth's Attorney, and County Attorney. Prosecutor Quarterly Report details demographics of participants, how many participants declined participation, and how many participants were denied participation in the program by the prosecutor. Behavioral Health Provider Report includes level of care, educational and employment training, housing status, and insurance information.

Recovery Services

Rehabilitative treatment services that shall include but not limited to any or all of the following: (a) Outpatient treatment; (b) National Alliance of Recovery Residences or the

Council of Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities certified housing; (c) Medication treatment; (d) Personal and family counseling; (e) Substance abuse education and prevention classes or counseling; (f) Vocational training; (g) Literacy training; (h) Community service; (i) Inpatient or residential behavioral health treatment as needed to address; 1. Impaired capacity to use self-control, judgment, or discretion related to behavior; 2. Severe dependence; 3. Special detoxification; 4. Relapse; or 5. Other treatments recommended by a qualified mental health professional; (j) Restorative practices designed to make the participant accountable to the victim when there is an identified victim, and it is safe to do so; (k) Recovery housing assistance; and (l) Recovery housing programs that have an established third party outcome evaluation

Report 1 (14-day Report)

Report due fourteen days after the agreement to participate in the program was signed. Report includes level of care, employment, educational, housing, and insurance status. Report also includes case management services provided by the qualified mental health provider.

Report 2 (42-day Report)

Report due forty-two days after the agreement to participate in the program was signed. Report includes level of care, insurance information, education and employment updates, and case management services provided by the qualified mental health provider.

Senate Bill 90

The Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program signed by Governor Beshear in 2022.

Substance Use Disorder

A cluster of cognitive, behavioral, and physiological symptoms indicating that the individual continues using the substance despite significant substance-related problems (KRS 222.005)
