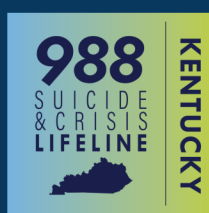

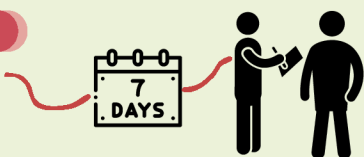
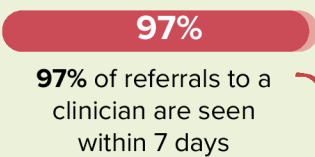
Youth Drop-In Centers

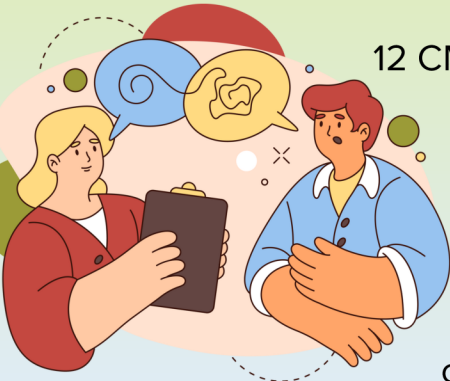

Awarded 4-year, \$12 million grant to expand infrastructure and services for children/youth with or at risk of developing SED who have child welfare or justice involvement

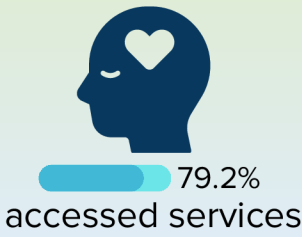

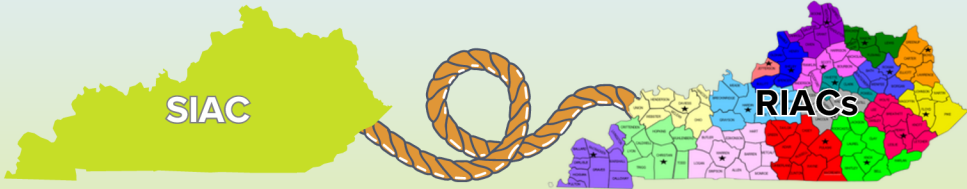

## Substance Use Disorder

The **Kentucky Overdose Response Effort (KORE)** aims to reduce overdose deaths by expanding and sustaining a comprehensive, equitable, recovery-oriented system of care.



# Adult Mental Health

## Comprehensive Services for Adults with Serious Mental Illness (SMI)



### Olmstead Housing Initiative

meets the housing needs of persons with SMI who are transitioning from long-term stays in an institution, or who are at risk of institutionalization



**14** Assertive Community Treatment Teams served **660** clients with SMI in over **98** counties



**13,364** individuals with SMI received Peer Support Services to prevent an institutional level of care

**672** individuals received Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH) services

202A Involuntary hospitalization of a person with a mental illness → **10,776** evaluations conducted by CMHCs

202B Involuntary admission of a person with an intellectual disability → Reduced the number of people diverted to ICF institutionalization by **52.5%**

202C Petition for involuntary hospitalization → KCPC received **11** new 202C patients




## System of Care for Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities



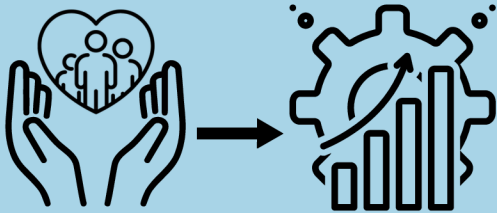

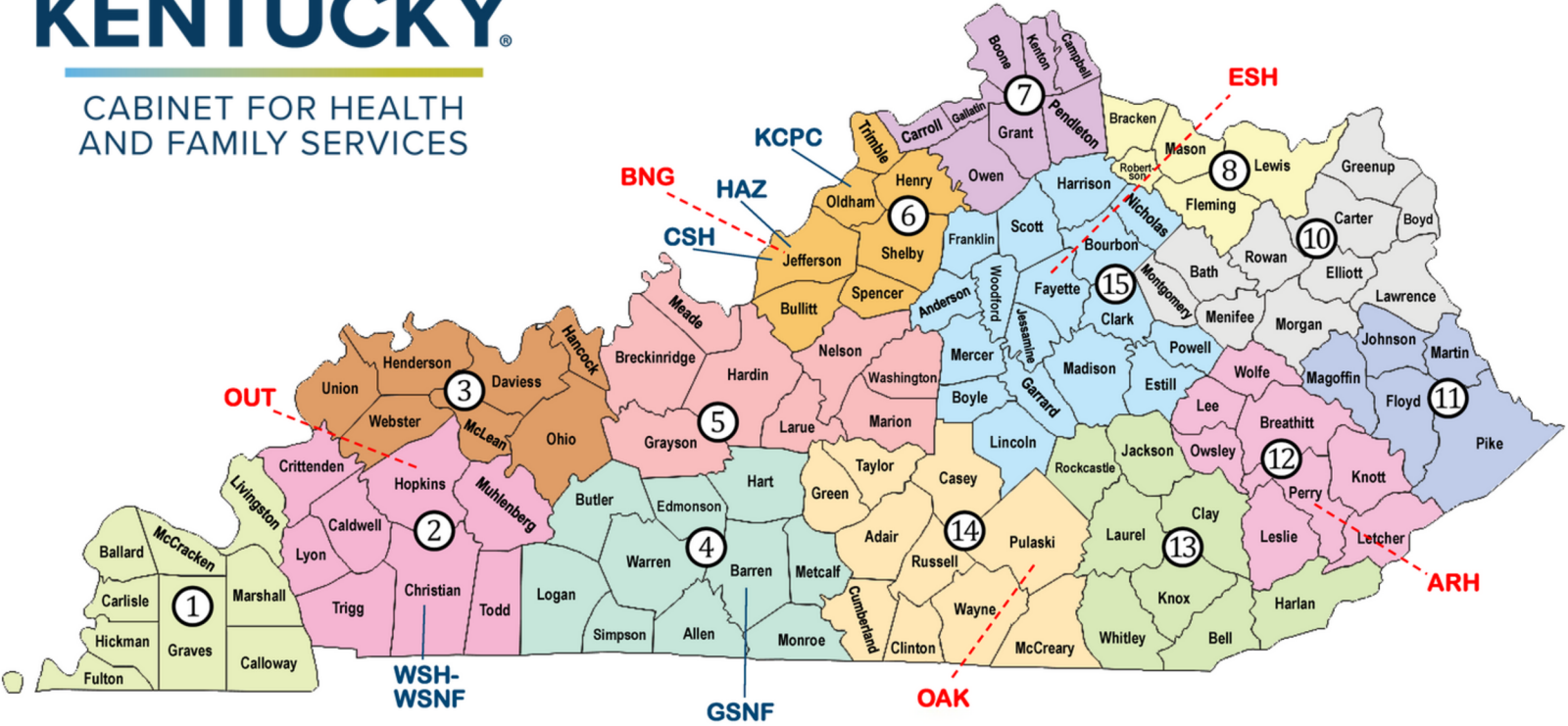
Workforce Innovation and Development
