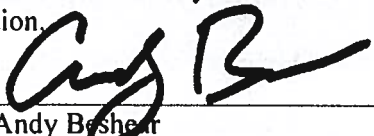


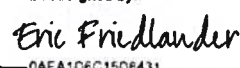
STATEMENT OF EMERGENCY
907 KAR 3:160E

This emergency administrative regulation is being promulgated to establish and fully implement reimbursement and provider changes required by 2022's Senate Bill 8. This emergency administrative regulation is needed pursuant to KRS 13A.190(1)(a)3. to comply with the legislative mandate established in 2022's SB 8 to reorganize and modify reimbursement for children's advocacy centers. This emergency administrative regulation is also needed pursuant to KRS 13A.190(1)(a)2. to preserve state and federal funding to coincide with federal funding approvals. Finally, DMS needs this administrative regulation pursuant to KRS 13A.190(1)(a)1. to preserve the welfare of Medicaid recipients. Emergency implementation of this administrative regulation is necessary to stabilize and enhance the services that are provided by children's advocacy centers by various provider types to additional Medicaid recipients.

This emergency administrative regulation shall be replaced by an ordinary administrative regulation. The ordinary administrative regulation is identical to this emergency administrative regulation.

8 NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY: [~~EO 2004-726, effective July 9, 2004,~~
9 ~~reorganized the Cabinet for Health Services and placed the Department for Medicaid Services~~
10 ~~and the Medicaid Program under the Cabinet for Health and Family Services.~~] The Cabinet for
11 Health and Family Services, Department for Medicaid Services has responsibility to administer
12 the Medicaid program. KRS 205.520(3) authorizes the cabinet, by administrative regulation, to
13 comply with a requirement that may be imposed, or opportunity presented, by federal law for the
14 provision of medical assistance to Kentucky's indigent citizenry. This administrative regulation
15 establishes the requirements for providers and reimbursement by the Medicaid program for ser-
16 vices provided by a specialized children's services clinic.

17 Section 1. Definitions. (1) "Affiliation agreement" means a written agreement between a pro-
18 vider and a children's advocacy center to perform a child [~~sexual abuse~~] medical evaluation [~~ex-~~
19 ~~amination~~].

20 (2) "Approved behavioral health practitioner" means an independently licensed practitioner

1 who is:

2 (a) A physician;

3 (b) A psychiatrist;

4 (c) An advanced practice registered nurse;

5 (d) A physician assistant;

6 (e) A licensed psychologist;

7 (f) A licensed psychological practitioner;

8 (g) A certified psychologist with autonomous functioning;

9 (h) A licensed clinical social worker;

10 (i) A licensed professional clinical counselor;

11 (j) A licensed marriage and family therapist;

12 (k) A licensed professional art therapist;

13 (l) A licensed clinical alcohol and drug counselor; or

14 (m) A licensed behavior analyst.

15 (3) "Approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision" means an individual under
16 billing supervision of an approved behavioral health practitioner who is:

17 (a)1. A licensed psychological associate working under the supervision of a board-approved
18 licensed psychologist;

19 2. A certified psychologist working under the supervision of a board-approved licensed psy-
20 chologist;

21 3. A marriage and family therapy associate;

22 4. A certified social worker;

23 5. A licensed professional counselor associate;

1 6. A licensed professional art therapist associate;

2 7. A licensed clinical alcohol and drug counselor associate;

3 8. A certified alcohol and drug counselor; or

4 9. A licensed assistant behavior analyst; and

5 (b) Employed by or under contract with the same billing provider as the billing supervisor.

6 (4) "Child medical evaluation" is defined by KRS 205.557(1)(c)[~~"Child sexual abuse medi-~~
7 ~~cal examination" means an examination to determine child sexual abuse that includes:~~

8 ~~—(a) A medical history taken from the child and a nonimplicated parent, guardian or primary~~
9 ~~caretaker;~~

10 ~~—(b) A physical examination with detailed attention to the anogenital area;~~

11 ~~—(c) If clinically indicated, a colposcopic examination; and~~

12 ~~—(d) A mental health screening, provided on the same day and at the same location as the phys-~~
13 ~~ical examination, to determine the impact of the alleged abuse on the mental health status of the~~
14 ~~child and the need for mental health services].~~

15 (5)[(3)] "Children's advocacy center" is defined in KRS 620.020(4).

16 (6)[(4)] "Department" means the Department for Medicaid Services or its designated agent.

17 (7)[(5)] "Medically necessary" or "medical necessity" means that a covered benefit is deter-
18 mined to be needed in accordance with 907 KAR 3:130.

19 (8) "Sexual assault nurse examiner" or "SANE" is defined in KRS 314.011(14).

20 (9)[(6)] "Mental health professional" means:

21 ~~—(a) A psychologist as defined in KRS 319.010(8);~~

22 ~~—(b) A licensed clinical social worker in accordance with KRS 335.100;~~

23 ~~—(c) An advanced registered nurse practitioner as defined in KRS 314.011(7);~~

1 ~~—(d) A licensed marriage and family therapist as defined in KRS 335.300(2);~~

4 ~~—(7)] "Specialized children's services clinic" means a clinic enrolled with the Kentucky Medi-~~
5 ~~caid program that provides child [sexual abuse] medical evaluations [examinations] and that~~
6 ~~meets the requirements of Section 3 of this administrative regulation.~~

7 ~~[(8) "Usual and customary charge" means the amount a provider bills to the general public.]~~

8 Section 2. Covered Services. (1) A child medical evaluation~~[child sexual abuse medical ex-~~
9 ~~amination]~~ provided as a clinic service by a specialized children's services clinic shall be cov-
10 ered if medically necessary and provided to a recipient who is under the age of eighteen (18)
11 years.

12 (2) Consistent with KRS 205.557(1)(c), a child medical evaluation is any combination of one
13 (1) or more of the following services:

14 1. A medical history taken from the child and a nonimplicated parent, guardian, or primary
15 caretaker;

16 2. A comprehensive physical examination;

17 3. Laboratory services;

18 4. Photo documentation;

19 5. Follow-up evaluation;

20 6. A mental health screening to determine the impact of the alleged abuse on the mental health
21 status of the child and the need for mental health services; or

22 7. An evidence-based trauma screening approved by the Children's Advocacy Centers of
23 Kentucky, or its successor agency.

1 (3) A child medical evaluation~~[child sexual abuse medical examination]~~ shall be performed

2 by:

3 (a) A licensed physician, advance practice registered nurse, physician assistant, or sexual as-
4 sault nurse examiner who:

5 1. Completes the medical history and physical examination;

6 2. Is employed by, under contract with, or has an affiliation agreement with a specialized
7 children's services clinic;

8 3. Has received specialized training in the medical examination of sexually-abused children;
9 and

10 4. ~~[Has received specialized training in the use of a colposcope and has access to a colposcope~~
11 ~~in the specialized children's services clinic; and~~

12 —5.] Shall make reports resulting from child medical evaluations~~[child sexual abuse medical~~
13 ~~examinations]~~ available for peer review and maintain confidentiality in accordance with Section
14 7[6] of this administrative regulation; and

15 (b) As necessary, an approved behavioral health practitioner or an approved behavioral health
16 practitioner under supervision~~[a mental health professional]~~ who:

17 1. Performs a mental health screening or evidence-based trauma screening to determine the
18 mental health status of the child and the need for further mental health services;

19 2. Is ~~[directly]~~ supervised by the physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice regis-
20 tered nurse who performs the medical examination and evaluation;

21 3. Is employed by, under contract with, or has an affiliation agreement with a specialized
22 children's services clinic; and

1 4. Has received specialized training in the mental health screening or evidence-based trauma
2 screening and assessment of sexually-abused children.

3 (4) The following mental health treatment services may be offered by a specialized children's
4 services clinic to a person who is involved with or impacted by the subject matter of a child med-
5 ical evaluation:

6 (a) A screening shall:

7 1. Determine the likelihood that an individual has a mental health disorder, a substance use
8 disorder, or co-occurring disorders;

9 2. Not establish the presence or specific type of disorder;

10 3. Establish the need for an in-depth assessment;

11 4. Be provided by:

12 a. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

13 b. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision.

14 (b) An assessment shall:

15 1. Include gathering information and engaging in a process with the individual that enables
16 the provider to:

17 a. Establish the presence or absence of a mental health disorder, substance use disorder, or co-
18 occurring disorders;

19 b. Determine the individual's readiness for change;

20 c. Identify the individual's strengths or problem areas that may affect the treatment and recov-
21 ery processes; and

22 d. Engage the individual in developing an appropriate treatment relationship;

23 2. Establish or rule out the existence of a clinical disorder or service need;

1 3. Include working with the individual to develop a treatment and service plan;

2 4. Not include a psychological or psychiatric evaluation or assessment; and

3 5. Be provided by:

4 a. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

5 b. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision.

6 (c) Crisis intervention:

7 1. Shall be a therapeutic intervention for the purpose of immediately reducing or eliminating
8 the risk of physical or emotional harm to:

9 a. The recipient; or

10 b. Another individual;

11 2. Shall consist of clinical intervention and support services necessary to provide integrated
12 crisis response, crisis stabilization interventions, or crisis prevention activities for an individual
13 with a behavioral health disorder;

14 3. Shall be provided:

15 a. On-site at a specialized children's clinic;

16 b. As an immediate relief to the presenting problem or threat; and

17 c. In a one-on-one encounter between the provider and the recipient, which is delivered either
18 in-person or via telehealth if appropriate pursuant to 907 KAR 3:170;

19 4. May include:

20 a. Verbal de-escalation, risk assessment, or cognitive therapy; or

21 b. Further service planning including:

22 (i) Lethal means reduction for suicide; or

23 (ii) Substance use disorder or relapse prevention;

1 5. Shall be followed by a referral to non-crisis services if applicable; and

2 6. Shall be provided by:

3 a. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

4 b. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision.

5 (d)1. Intensive outpatient program services shall:

6 a. Be an alternative to or transition from a higher level of care for a mental health disorder;

7 b. Offer a multi-modal, multi-disciplinary structured outpatient treatment program that is sig-
8 nificantly more intensive than individual outpatient therapy, group outpatient therapy, or family
9 outpatient therapy;

10 c. Be provided at least three (3) hours per day at least three (3) days per week for adults;

11 d. Be provided at least six (6) hours per week for adolescents;

12 e. Include:

13 (i) Individual outpatient therapy, group outpatient therapy, or family outpatient therapy unless
14 contraindicated;

15 (ii) Crisis intervention; or

16 (iii) Psycho-education related to identified goals in the recipient's treatment plan; and

17 f. Be provided in-person.

18 2. During psycho-education, the recipient or recipient's family member shall be:

19 a. Provided with knowledge regarding the recipient's diagnosis, the causes of the condition,
20 and the reasons why a particular treatment might be effective for reducing symptoms; and

21 b. Taught how to cope with the recipient's diagnosis or condition in a successful manner.

22 3. An intensive outpatient program services treatment plan shall:

23 a. Be individualized; and

1 b. Focus on stabilization and transition to a lesser level of care.

2 4. To provide intensive outpatient program services, a specialized services clinic shall have:

3 a. Access to a board-certified or board-eligible psychiatrist for consultation;

4 b. Access to a psychiatrist, physician, or advanced practiced registered nurse for medication
5 prescribing and monitoring;

6 c. Adequate staffing to ensure a minimum recipient-to-staff ratio of ten (10) recipients to one
7 (1) staff person;

8 d. The capacity to provide services utilizing a recognized intervention protocol based on na-
9 tionally accepted treatment principles; and

10 e. The capacity to employ staff authorized to provide intensive outpatient program services in
11 accordance with this section and to coordinate the provision of services among team members.

12 5. Intensive outpatient program services shall be provided by:

13 a. An approved behavioral health practitioner, except for a licensed behavior analyst; or

14 b. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision, except for a licensed assis-
15 tant behavior analyst.

16 (e) Individual outpatient therapy shall:

17 1. Be provided to promote the:

18 a. Health and wellbeing of the individual; and

19 b. Restoration of a recipient to the recipient's best possible functional level from a mental
20 health disorder;

21 2. Consist of:

22 a. An in-person or via telehealth as appropriate pursuant to 907 KAR 3:170, one-on-one en-
23 counter between the provider and recipient; and

1 b. A behavioral health therapeutic intervention provided in accordance with the recipient's
2 identified treatment plan;

3 3. Be aimed at:

4 a. Reducing adverse symptoms;

5 b. Reducing or eliminating the presenting problem of the recipient; and

6 c. Improving functionality;

7 4. Not exceed three (3) hours per day; and

8 5. Be provided by:

9 a. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

10 b. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision.

11 (f)1. Family outpatient therapy shall consist of an in-person, or via telehealth as appropriate
12 pursuant to 907 KAR 3:170, behavioral health therapeutic intervention provided:

13 a. Through scheduled therapeutic visits between the therapist and the recipient and at least one
14 (1) member of the recipient's family; and

15 b. To address issues interfering with the relational functioning of the family and to improve
16 interpersonal relationships within the recipient's home environment.

17 2. A family outpatient therapy session shall be billed as one (1) service regardless of the num-
18 ber of individuals, including multiple members from one (1) family, who participate in the ses-
19 sion.

20 3. Family outpatient therapy shall:

21 a. Be provided to promote the:

22 (i) Health and wellbeing of the individual; or

23 (ii) Restoration of a recipient to their best possible functional level from a mental health dis-

1 order; and

2 b. Not exceed three (3) hours per day alone or in combination with any other outpatient thera-
3 py per recipient unless additional time is medically necessary.

4 4. Family outpatient therapy shall be provided by:

5 a. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

6 b. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision.

7 (g)1. Group outpatient therapy shall:

8 a. Be a behavioral health therapeutic intervention provided in accordance with a recipient's
9 identified plan of care;

10 b. Be provided to promote the:

11 (i) Health and wellbeing of the individual; and

12 (ii) Restoration of a recipient to their best possible functional level from a mental health dis-
13 order;

14 c. Consist of an in-person, or via telehealth as appropriate pursuant to 907 KAR 3:170, behav-
15 ioral health therapeutic intervention provided in accordance with the recipient's identified treat-
16 ment plan;

17 d. Be provided to a recipient in a group setting:

18 (i) Of nonrelated individuals; and

19 (ii) Not to exceed twelve (12) individuals in size;

20 e. Focus on the psychological needs of the recipients as evidenced in each recipient's plan of
21 care;

22 f. Center on goals including building and maintaining healthy relationships, personal goals
23 setting, and the exercise of personal judgment;

1 g. Not include physical exercise, a recreational activity, an educational activity, or a social
2 activity; and

3 h. Not exceed three (3) hours per day alone or in combination with any other outpatient thera-
4 py per recipient unless additional time is medically necessary.

5 2. A family outpatient therapy group shall have a:

6 a. Deliberate focus; and

7 b. Defined course of treatment.

8 3. The subject of a group receiving group outpatient therapy shall be related to each recipient
9 participating in the group.

10 4. The provider shall keep individual notes regarding each recipient within the group and
11 within each recipient's health record.

12 5. Family outpatient therapy shall be provided by:

13 a. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

14 b. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision.

15 (h)1. Collateral outpatient therapy shall:

16 a. Consist of an in-person or appropriate telehealth, provided pursuant to 907 KAR 3:170, be-
17 havioral health consultation:

18 (i) With a parent or caregiver of a recipient, household member of a recipient, legal repre-
19 sentative of a recipient, school personnel, treating professional, or other person with custodial
20 control or supervision of the recipient; and

21 (ii) That is provided in accordance with the recipient's treatment plan; and

22 b. Not exceed three (3) hours per day alone or in combination with any other outpatient thera-
23 py per recipient unless additional time is medically necessary.

1 2. Written consent by a parent or custodial guardian to discuss a recipient's treatment with
2 any person other than a parent or legal guardian shall be signed and filed in the recipient's health
3 record.

4 3. Collateral outpatient therapy shall be provided by:

5 a. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

6 b. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision.

7 (i) 1. Peer support services shall:

8 a. Be emotional support that is provided by:

9 (i) An individual who has been trained and certified in accordance with 908 KAR 2:220 and
10 who is experiencing or has experienced a mental health disorder to a recipient by sharing a simi-
11 lar mental health disorder in order to bring about a desired social or personal change;

12 (ii) A parent or other family member, who has been trained and certified in accordance with
13 908 KAR 2:230, of a child having or who has had a mental health disorder to a parent or family
14 member of a child sharing a similar mental health disorder in order to bring about a desired so-
15 cial or personal change; or

16 (iii) An individual, who has been trained and certified in accordance with 908 KAR 2:240 and
17 identified as experiencing as a child or youth an emotional, social, or behavioral disorder that is
18 defined in the current version of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual for Mental Disorders;

19 b. Be an evidence-based practice;

20 c. Be structured and scheduled non-clinical therapeutic activities with an individual recipient
21 or a group of recipients;

22 d. Promote socialization, recovery, self-advocacy, preservation, and enhancement of commu-
23 nity living skills for the recipient;

1 e. Be coordinated within the context of a comprehensive, individualized plan of care devel-
2 oped through a person-centered planning process;

3 f. Be identified in each recipient's plan of care;

4 g. Be designed to directly contribute to the recipient's individualized goals as specified in the
5 recipient's plan of care; and

6 h. Be provided face-to-face or via telehealth, as established pursuant to 907 KAR 3:170.

7 2. To provide peer support services, a specialized children's services clinic shall:

8 a. Have demonstrated:

9 (i) The capacity to provide peer support services for the behavioral health population being
10 served including the age range of the population being served; and

11 (ii) Experience in serving individuals with behavioral health disorders;

12 b. Employ peer support specialists who are qualified to provide peer support services in ac-
13 cordance with 908 KAR 2:220, 908 KAR 2:230, or 908 KAR 2:240;

14 c. Use an approved behavioral health practitioner to supervise peer support specialists;

15 d. Have the capacity to coordinate the provision of services among team members;

16 e. Have the capacity to provide ongoing continuing education and technical assistance to peer
17 support specialists;

18 f. Require individuals providing peer support services to recipients to provide no more than
19 thirty (30) hours per week of direct recipient contact; and

20 g. Require peer support services provided to recipients in a group setting not exceeding eight
21 (8) individuals within any group at a time.

22 (5) Ongoing mental health treatment services shall be provided by:

23 (a)1. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

1 2. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision; and

2 (b)1. A provider who is an employee of the specialized children's services clinic; or

3 2. A provider who has a contractual relationship with the specialized children's services clinic
4 and who does not duplicate the provided behavioral health services to the recipient for another
5 Medicaid provider.

6 Section 3. Provider Requirements. (1) A provider shall be enrolled with the department as a
7 specialized children's services clinic.

8 (2) A specialized children's services clinic shall be a children's advocacy center whose pro-
9 viders are employed by, under contract with, or have a signed affiliation agreement with the clin-
10 ic.

11 (3) A SANE who is a registered nurse, but not an APRN, shall be under the supervision of a
12 physician, APRN, or physician assistant who is employed or contractually associated with the
13 specialized children's services clinic for billing purposes.

14 Section 4. Billing for Services. (1) A child medical evaluation~~[child sexual abuse medical ex-~~
15 ~~amination]~~ shall be billed by a specialized children's services clinic as a comprehensive clinic
16 service which shall include:

17 (a) The services of the:

18 1. Physician;

19 2. Advanced practice registered nurse;

20 3. Physician assistant; or

21 4. SANE.

22 (b) Mental health screening services provided by an approved behavioral health practitioner
23 or an approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision~~[a mental health professional];~~

1 (c) Services and supplies furnished as an incidental part of the ~~[physician's]~~ professional ser-
2 vices performed by a provider listed in paragraph (a) of this subsection in the course of diagnosis
3 and treatment; ~~or~~[and]

4 (d) Medical services provided by other clinic employees under the direct supervision of the
5 physician, advanced practice registered nurse, physician assistant, or SANE; or

6 (e) Follow-up services provided by the physician, advanced practice registered nurse, physi-
7 cian assistant, SANE, approved behavioral health practitioner, or approved behavioral health
8 practitioner under supervision.

9 (2) Child medical evaluation services provided by a physician, advanced practice registered
10 nurse, physician assistant, SANE, or an approved behavioral health practitioner or an approved
11 behavioral health practitioner under supervision~~[mental health professional]~~ employed by, under
12 contract with, or having a signed affiliation agreement with a specialized children's services clin-
13 ic shall be billed under the clinic's provider number using a single reimbursement code designat-
14 ed by the department.

15 (3) Mental health treatment by an approved behavioral health practitioner or approved behav-
16 ioral health practitioner under supervision shall be billed per encounter by the specialized chil-
17 dren's services clinic as consistent with the Outpatient Behavioral Health Fee Schedule, or its
18 successor fee schedule, and Section 2 of this administrative regulation.

19 (4)(a) A specialized children's services clinic may provide laboratory services directly if:

20 1. The clinic has the appropriate CLIA certificate to perform laboratory testing pursuant to
21 907 KAR 1:028; and

22 2. The services are prescribed by a physician, advanced practice registered nurse, physician
23 assistant, or SANE who has a contractual relationship with the clinic.

1 (b) If a specialized children's services clinic does not have the appropriate CLIA certificate to
2 perform necessary laboratory testing, it shall establish a contractual relationship with a laborato-
3 ry or facility with the appropriate CLIA certificate in order to perform any laboratory service re-
4 quired pursuant to this administrative regulation. The contracted laboratory shall not separately
5 bill for any services provided for a specialized children's services clinic that are also submitted
6 for reimbursement pursuant to this administrative regulation.

7 (c) Laboratory services may be administered, as appropriate, by:

8 1. A physician;

9 2. An APRN;

10 3. A physician assistant;

11 4. A SANE;

12 5. An approved behavioral health practitioner; or

13 6. An approved behavioral health practitioner under supervision.

14 Section 5. Reimbursement. (1) The department shall establish a prospective payment[a
15 statewide reimbursement] rate or rates for each specialized children's services clinic based on an
16 annual cost report or survey[a review of cost data and a consideration of rates paid to providers
17 for similar services].

18 (a) The prospective payment rate will reflect a true and actual cost for a specialized children's
19 services clinic as established by expenses from the previous year.

20 (b) The prospective reimbursement rate shall incorporate additional expected expenses for the
21 next year, including expected inflation for the next year.

1 (2)(a) A managed care organization shall accept the surveys submitted by the department and
2 the department's determination of a prospective reimbursement rate for each and any specialized
3 children's services clinic.

4 (b) A managed care organization shall not require separate submission of a cost report by a
5 specialized children's services clinic to the managed care organization. [The initial rate of reim-
6 bursement for a child sexual abuse medical examination shall be the lesser of:

7 ~~—(a) An all-inclusive statewide rate of \$538 per examination; or~~

8 ~~—(b) The provider's usual and customary charge for the service.~~

9 ~~—(3) The department shall determine the statewide rate using updated cost data submitted on an~~
10 ~~annual cost report from the center.]~~

11 (3) (a) The department shall utilize the rates established pursuant to subsection (1) of this sec-
12 tion to inform the prospective reimbursement rate.

13 (b)1. A cost report shall be submitted by each center annually or upon request by the depart-
14 ment.

15 2. A specialized children's clinic may submit a cost report to the department at any time that
16 there is an increase of five (5) percent in cost during the year.

17 (4)(a) An ongoing mental health treatment service shall be billed consistent with Section 4(3)
18 of this administrative regulation.

19 (b) The department and each managed care organization shall reimburse at least at the mini-
20 mum of the rates published on the Outpatient Behavioral Health Fee Schedule, or its successor
21 fee schedule, for services related to ongoing mental health treatment.

5 Section 9. The department may administer any benefits or services related to a specialized
6 children's services clinic outside of the managed care benefit.

7 Section 10. Federal Approval and Federal Financial Participation. The cabinet's coverage and
8 reimbursement of services pursuant to this administrative regulation shall be contingent upon:

9 (1) Receipt of federal financial participation for the coverage and reimbursement; and

10 (2) Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services' approval of the coverage and reimburse-
11 ment, as relevant.

(a) What this administrative regulation does: This administrative regulation establishes the requirements for providers and reimbursement by the Medicaid program for services provided by a specialized children's services clinic.

(b) The necessity of this administrative regulation: KRS 205.520(3) authorizes the cabinet, by administrative regulation, to comply with any requirement that may be imposed or opportunity presented by federal law to qualify for federal Medicaid funds.

(c) How this administrative regulation conforms to the content of the authorizing statutes: This administrative regulation conforms to the content of the authorizing statutes by establishing reimbursement provisions and requirements regarding services provided by specialized children's services clinics.

(d) How this administrative regulation currently assists or will assist in the effective administration of the statutes: This administrative regulation assists in the effective administration of the authorizing statutes by establishing reimbursement provisions and requirements regarding services provided by specialized children's services clinics.

(2) If this is an amendment to an existing administrative regulation, provide a brief summary of:

(a) How the amendment will change this existing administrative regulation: The amendment changes the administrative regulation to incorporate changes made by the 2022 Regular Session's SB 8. The changes include defining new terms to modernize behavioral health treatment and behavioral health treatment providers within this administrative regulation. In addition, the previous term of a "child sex abuse medical examination" is being removed in favor of the broader concept of a "child medical evaluation" as found in the 2022 Regular Session's SB 8. The new term will also allow for investigation of physical abuse and neglect by the children's advocacy centers. In addition, new provider types of physician assistants, advanced practice registered nurses, and sexual assault nurse examiners are allowed to provide services within these facilities. This concept of a child medical evaluation is further being expanded to include a Children's Advocacy Centers of Kentucky approved evidence-based trauma screening. The department is also introducing nine (9) ongoing outpatient behavioral health services and a modernized listing of approved behavioral health practitioners and practitioners under supervision. The new services include screening, assessment, crisis intervention, intensive outpatient program, individual outpatient therapy, group therapy, family therapy, collateral therapy, and peer support services. The services may be provided by any of 13 behavioral health practitioner types or nine behavioral health practitioner types under supervision.

The payment methodology of a child medical evaluation is being expanded to meet SB 8's requirement of paying the "true and actual cost" of the child advocacy centers/specialized children's services clinics. On an initial basis, two reimbursement sections will be included. As

the bill is implemented, an enhanced fee schedule will be utilized. In the alternative, and at the option of the child advocacy center, during the implementation phase an updated comprehensive rate could be billed.

As cost surveys are developed and prepared, a prospective payment system rate (PPS) reimbursement will be implemented. The managed care organizations (MCOs) will be required to utilize the cost reports and cost surveys developed and implemented by DMS in consultation with the child advocacy centers. In both reimbursement sections, the new behavioral health services will be conducted outside of the enhanced fee schedule or PPS rate. DMS and the MCOs will be required to reimburse mental health services at least at 100% of the established rates on the Outpatient Behavioral Health Fee Schedule. In addition, additional requirements and standards for laboratory services are being included. The department is also reserving the ability to completely remove this benefit and provider type from managed care in order to lessen administrative burden. Finally, a federal financial participation clause is being included to further modernize the administrative regulation.

(b) The necessity of the amendment to this administrative regulation: The amendment is necessary to expand reimbursement for services provided within children's advocacy centers as required by SB 8. In addition, 3 new providers will be able to provide and participate in a child medical evaluation. In addition, several new behavioral health services will be able to be provided by these facilities.

(c) How the amendment conforms to the content of the authorizing statutes: This administrative regulation conforms to the content of the authorizing statutes by incorporating changes made by 2022 RS SB 8.

(d) How the amendment will assist in the effective administration of the statutes: This amendment will assist in the effective administration of the statutes by implementing reimbursement changes made by 2022 RS SB 8.

(3) List the type and number of individuals, businesses, organizations, or state and local government affected by this administrative regulation: The administrative regulation affects approximately 15 children's advocacy centers and satellite facilities providing services within each of Kentucky's Area Development Districts.

(4) Provide an analysis of how the entities identified in question (3) will be impacted by either the implementation of this administrative regulation, if new, or by the change, if it is an amendment, including:

(a) List the actions that each of the regulated entities identified in question (3) will have to take to comply with this administrative regulation or amendment: They will need to follow any new reimbursement provisions and covered service policy requirements established in the administrative regulation.

(b) In complying with this administrative regulation or amendment, how much will it cost each of the entities identified in question (3): There will be no additional costs.

(c) As a result of compliance, what benefits will accrue to the entities identified in question (3): Regulated entities will receive a "true and actual cost" reimbursement driven by the payment of an enhanced fee schedule and a prospective payment rate. In addition, expanded behavioral health services will be available.
