#### **OVERVIEW**

In 2019, the Kentucky Department for Public Health (KDPH) was awarded the First Responders-Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (FR-CARA) Grant by The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). The goal of the FR-CARA Grant in Kentucky is to expand naloxone (NARCAN®) training and dispensing for first responders throughout rural Appalachian counties and to increase awareness for ongoing harm reduction activities and personal safety measures for opioid exposures.

## TRAINING

To receive NARCAN® through the FR-CARA Grant, all first responders from requesting agencies must be trained to administer the drug. Training focuses on recognizing/responding to an overdose, basic tenets of addiction, opioid exposures, and the roles of treatment and harm reduction programs. An instructor-led class offering first responder training credits is available through the Kentucky Fire Commission and online through KY TRAIN/KBEMS. Approved NARCAN® requests will be shipped to the requesting agency or partnering LHD, if required.
