

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

#### Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Adair County received \$354,137 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 4 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 15 children in Out of Home Care, 13 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$1,394.

13% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 86% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

1 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Adair County received \$869,918 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 230 providers a month. The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 741 children a month, collecting \$1,020,357 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 35 orders.
