

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 7 members in Barren County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$360,451 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 156 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 6,154 people a month in Barren County, stretching over 2,745 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$11,526,471

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Barren County received \$795,060 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$296,050. Additional grants totaled \$154,221. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Barren County received \$96,464 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 193 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 2,584 children, collecting \$3,400,569 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 2,209 orders.

There were 151 children cared for by foster families, 121 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$10,122.

27% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 72% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 12,699 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 39,864 of the 91,527 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 2,323 prescribers and 319 dispenser DEA numbers.

Lifeskills served 8,568 individuals in their region in fiscal year 2023.



Barren is located in the Lifeskills region. This region received \$1,112,084 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for fiscal year 2023.
