
Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Bell County received \$877,349 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 13 full-time staff and 4 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 22 children in Out of Home Care, 17 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$1,479.

50% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 50% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Bell County received \$636,916 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 217 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 2,315 children a month, collecting \$1,853,261 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 139 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 8,379 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 54,294 of the 99,911 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,717 prescribers and 226 dispenser DEA numbers.

Bell County is served by the Cumberland River Community Mental Health Center. Cumberland River received \$7,744,292 in FY 2022.

Cumberland River served 11,714 individuals in their region.



Bell is located in the Cumberland River Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$2,496,403 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.
