

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 28 members in Bell County.

#### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$862,059 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 328 households in the past fiscal year.

### Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Bell County received \$671,790 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$523,010. Additional grants totaled \$6,715. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Bell County received \$67,669 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 153 providers a month. The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 2,268 children, collecting \$1,775,340 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 2,344 orders.

There were 21 children cared for by foster families, 13 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$1,081.

28% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 71% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).
