Kentucky**

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 24 members in Bell County.

### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$1,356,656 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 344 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 7,573 people a month in Bell County, stretching over 3,625 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2024: \$15,697,737

During fiscal year 2024, in Bell county there were 11 people enrolled in Quit Now Kentucky (no-cost tobacco quitline), QUIT Now Kentucky provided 3,947 coaching sessions across the Commonwealth.

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Bell County received \$690,369 in funding for 3 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 4,078, and 75% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$644,648. Additional grants totaled \$600.

Bell County received \$1,307,016 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 336 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 2,239 children, collecting \$1,810,983 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 2,263 orders.

There were 19 children cared for by foster families, 15 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$1,406.

10% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.  
89% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

**Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)**

According to KASPER data, 8,952 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 51,482 of the 98,924 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,766 prescribers and 237 dispenser DEA numbers.

Bell County is served by the Cumberland River Community Mental Health Center. Cumberland River received \$6,306,135 in fiscal year 2024.

Cumberland River served 10,682 individuals in their region in fiscal year 2024.

 Bell is located in the Cumberland River region. This region received \$1,978,335 in Kentucky Overdose Response Effort (KORE) funding for fiscal year 2024.

## Public Protection Services

The Office of the Ombudsman responded to 292 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2024 in your county.

The Office of Inspector General completed 87 background checks for children & elderly services in Bell county fiscal year 2024.
