


Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 7 members in Boyle County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$235,311 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 86 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 3,236 people a month in Boyle County, stretching over 1,524 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$6,005,992

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Boyle County received \$460,320 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$103,641. Additional grants totaled \$58,500. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Boyle County received \$69,610 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 146 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 1,236 children, collecting \$2,005,428 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 1,323 orders.

There were 53 children cared for by foster families, 42 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$4,011.

54% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 45% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 8,121 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 21,897 of the 57,403 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,996 prescribers and 349 dispenser DEA numbers.

Boyle is located in the New Vista region. This region received \$9,238,392 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for fiscal year 2023.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
