Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$127,871 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 45 households in the past fiscal year.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Caldwell County received \$278,138 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 4 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 16 children in Out of Home Care, 9 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$1,940.

62% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 37% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Caldwell County received \$109,166 from the Child Care
Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 51 providers
a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 692 children a month, collecting \$1,305,345 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 44 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 3,824 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 11,856 of the 29,013 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,095 prescribers and 175 dispenser DEA numbers.

Caldwell County is served by the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center. Pennyroyal received \$5,713,393 in FY 2022.

Pennyroyal served 8,694 individuals in their region.



Caldwell is located in the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$890,663 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.
