Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 16 members in Campbell County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Campbell County received \$2,020,978 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 12 full-time staff and 1 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 381 children in Out of Home Care, 311 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$28,414.

71% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption.
28% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

6 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Campbell County received \$2,522,055 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 586 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 4,051 children a month, collecting \$6,936,667 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 113 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 21,921 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 52,710 of the 148,574 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 4,281 prescribers and 335 dispenser DEA numbers.

Syringe Services Programs

Campbell County is served by the Northkey Community Mental Health Center. Northkey received \$8,417,964 in FY 2022.

Northkey served 11,278 individuals in their region.



Campbell is located in the Northkey Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$3,271,755 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.
