

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 6 members in Carter County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$496,318 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 151 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 4,571 people a month in Carter County, stretching over 2,124 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in FY2022: \$12,235,095

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Carter County received \$699,605 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 9 full-time staff and 5 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 54 children in Out of Home Care, 40 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$4,130.

50% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 50% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Carter County received \$176,334 from the Child Care
Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 75 providers
a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 1,604 children a month, collecting \$2,240,988 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 40 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 6,356 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 22,973 of the 47,243 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,554 prescribers and 234 dispenser DEA numbers.
