Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 3 members in Carter County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 4,082, and 62% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$505,931. Additional grants totaled \$6,000.

Carter County received \$548,867 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 170 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 1,442 children, collecting \$2,009,321 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 1,386 orders.

There were 49 children cared for by foster families, 45 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$4,196.

18% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 81% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).
