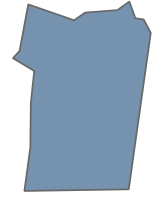

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 1 members in Christian County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$558,216 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 198 households in the past fiscal year.

COUNTY EARLY INTERVENTION & SUPPORT DIVISION

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Christian County received \$1,112,043 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 12 full-time staff and 1 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 186 children in Out of Home Care, 131 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$9,069.

36% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption.
63% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

1 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Christian County received \$2,568,759 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 718 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 4,055 children a month, collecting \$7,974,714 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 197 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 14,664 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 38,448 of the 99,331 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Christian County is served by the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center. Pennyroyal received \$5,713,393 in FY 2022.

Pennyroyal served 8,694 individuals in their region.

Christian is located in the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$890,663 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.
