Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Clark County received \$816,040 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 8 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 130 children in Out of Home Care, 119 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of 8,737.

30% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 69% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Clark County received \$1,760,883 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 442 providers a month. The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 1,789 children a month, collecting \$3,356,594 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 82 orders.
