Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 4 members in Franklin County.

### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$366,701 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 111 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 4,996 people a month in Franklin County, stretching over 2,311 households.

### Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Franklin County received \$829,968 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 10 full-time staff and 1 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 166 children in Out of Home Care, 115 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$6,536.

15% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 84% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

7 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Franklin County received \$1,792,398 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 486 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 2,076 children a month, collecting \$3,651,446 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 91 orders.

### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 14,201 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 42,921 of the 99,522 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 3,254 prescribers and 477 dispenser DEA numbers.
