


## **Garrard County - Fiscal Year 2023**

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

#### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$217,141 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 89 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 2,025 people a month in Garrard County, stretching over 902 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$3,859,207

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Garrard County received \$254,100 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$135,211. Additional grants totaled \$0. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Garrard County received \$45,167 from the Child Care
Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 91
providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 794 children, collecting \$1,111,353 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 761 orders.

There were 26 children cared for by foster families, 24 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$2,094.

19% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 80% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

#### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 5,335 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analysesics accounted for 17,924 of the 40,454 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,896 prescribers and 284 dispenser DEA numbers.

Garrard County is served by the New Vista Community Mental Health Center. New Vista received \$15,265,841 in fiscal year 2023.

New Vista served 13,593 individuals in their region in fiscal year 2023.



Garrard is located in the New Vista region. This region received \$9,238,392 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for fiscal year 2023.

#### **Public Protection Services**

The Office of the Ombudsman responded to 172 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2023 in your county.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
