Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

#### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Grant County received \$794,459 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 7 full-time staff and 1 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 72 children in Out of Home Care, 63 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$4,383.

36% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 63% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Grant County received \$994,295 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 276 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 1,524 children a month, collecting \$3,333,931 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 81 orders.
