


## **Grant County - Fiscal Year 2023**

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 2 members in Grant County.

#### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$222,313 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 79 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 2,963 people a month in Grant County, stretching over 1,167 households.

#### Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Grant County received \$511,560 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$231,101. Additional grants totaled \$174,600. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Grant County received \$109,535 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 181 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 1,436 children, collecting \$3,249,726 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 1,377 orders.

There were 52 children cared for by foster families, 38 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$2,795.

26% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 73% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

#### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 7,537 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 22,937 of the 52,152 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 2,262 prescribers and 261 dispenser DEA numbers.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
