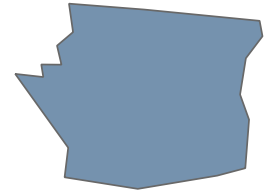

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$207,300 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 64 households in the past fiscal year.

### Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Hart County received \$452,284 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 4 full-time staff and 1 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 35 children in Out of Home Care, 34 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$2,879.

45% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption.

3 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

54% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Hart County received \$187,539 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 73 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 863 children a month, collecting \$1,504,927 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 36 orders.

### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 4,992 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 15,918 of the 36,723 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,552 prescribers and 233 dispenser DEA numbers.

### Syringe Services Programs

Hart County is served by the Lifeskills Community Mental Health Center. Lifeskills received \$10,360,488 in FY 2022.

Lifeskills served 8,702 individuals in their region.



Hart is located in the Lifeskills Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$1,172,368 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.

## Public Protection
