Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 1 members in Hopkins County.

#### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$369,761 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 176 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 6,143 people a month in Hopkins County, stretching over 2,761 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$11,913,197

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Hopkins County received \$871,920 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$391,495. Additional grants totaled \$16,060. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Hopkins County received \$57,822 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 127 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 2,376 children, collecting \$4,178,431 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 2,237 orders.

There were 41 children cared for by foster families, 33 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$0.

34% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 90% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

#### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 13,643 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 47,326 of the 107,952 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 2,368 prescribers and 345 dispenser DEA numbers.

The Office of the Ombudsman responded to 477 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2023 in your county.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
