Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 21 members in Jackson County.

### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$234,460 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 69 households in the past fiscal year.

### Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Jackson County received \$468,196 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 5 full-time staff and 1 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 28 children in Out of Home Care, 27 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$1,268.

10% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 89% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Jackson County received \$140,783 from the Child Care
Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 44 providers
a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 805 children a month, collecting \$1,010,541 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 46 orders.

### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 3,812 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 16,924 of the 35,194 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.
