Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 19 members in Johnson County.

## Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$448,444 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 157 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 4,658 people a month in Johnson County, stretching over 2,245 households.

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Johnson County received \$812,515 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 9 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 48 children in Out of Home Care, 35 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$2,371.

64% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 35% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

8 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Johnson County received \$156,828 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 91 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 1,398 children a month, collecting \$1,811,683 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 54 orders.

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## Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 6,945 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 36,529 of the 72,443 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,473 prescribers and 291 dispenser DEA numbers.

Johnson County is served by the Mountain Community Mental Health Center. Mountain received \$7,496,196 in FY 2022.

Mountain served 28,337 individuals in their region.



Johnson is located in the Mountain Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$1,637,498 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.
