Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 8 members in Kenton County.

#### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$905,772 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 373 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 12,593 people a month in Kenton County, stretching over 5,590 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$25,871,668

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Kenton County received \$2,140,950 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$497,036. Additional grants totaled \$576,400. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Kenton County received \$636,504 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 858 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 9,120 children, collecting \$17,090,288 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 9,510 orders.

There were 597 children cared for by foster families, 519 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$49,265.

34% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 60% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

#### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 42,342 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 98,564 of the 276,943 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 5,372 prescribers and 452 dispenser DEA numbers.
