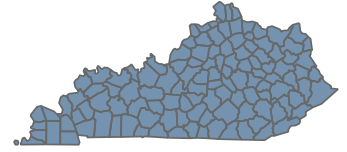

Kentucky

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 2,252 members in Kentucky.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Kentucky received \$41,652,000 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 17,050 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 553,872 people a month in Kentucky, stretching over 254,777 households. Total SNAP spending in the Commonwealth in fiscal year 2023: \$1,087,003,088

The KPAP helped 5,124 patients in Kentucky with 20,056 prescriptions to save a total of \$54,582,533 in prescription costs.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Kentucky received \$67,957,700 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$40,374,900. Additional grants totaled \$10,236,100. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

The Division of Family Resource and Youth Service Centers received \$13,857,400 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 2,000 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 212,752 children, collecting \$327,981,000 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 210,154 orders.

There were 8,421 children cared for by foster families, 7,021 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$603,525.

31% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
68% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

1,114 children adopted

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 1,222,960 unique patients residing in Kentucky received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 3,789,140 of the 9,177,970 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of Kentucky received these prescriptions from 39,261 prescribers and 1,695 dispenser DEA numbers.

The Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities awarded \$118,780,000 to the Community Mental Health Centers in fiscal year 2023. In total, 156,182 individuals received behavioral health and/or developmental and intellectual disabilities services and supports in fiscal year 2023.



The Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) program provided \$38,972,200 in FY 2023 to support a Commonwealth-wide comprehensive, recovery-oriented system of care to address the opioid epidemic in every community in Kentucky.

Public Protection Services

The Office of the Ombudsman had 50,281 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2023 throughout Kentucky.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
