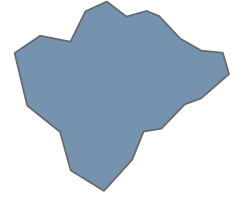

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 38 members in Knox County.

### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$876,267 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 271 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 9,136 people a month in Knox County, stretching over 4,209 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in FY2022: \$24,417,788

### Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Knox County received \$924,584 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 10 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 29 children in Out of Home Care, 28 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$1,876.

34% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption.  
65% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

11 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Knox County received \$1,225,844 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 391 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 2,167 children a month, collecting \$2,408,342 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 116 orders.

### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 10,313 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 51,324 of the 107,218 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,933 prescribers and 274 dispenser DEA numbers.
