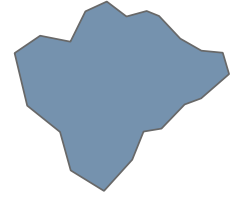

AmeriCorps
Kentucky

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 24 members in Knox County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$1,114,724 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 304 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 9,513 people a month in Knox County, stretching over 4,375 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2024: \$19,827,676

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Health Services

Funding to Knox County Health Department:
\$2,126,945

During fiscal year 2024, in Knox county there were 5 people enrolled in Quit Now Kentucky (no-cost tobacco quitline), QUIT Now Kentucky provided 3,947 coaching sessions across the Commonwealth.



Your county has 1,138 participants who received benefits totaling \$1,203,797.

There are 8 WIC-approved grocers in Knox County.

KPAP helped 89 patients in Knox with 248 prescriptions to save a total of \$898,705 in prescription costs.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Knox County received \$1,075,628 in funding for 1 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 4,651, and 75% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$738,054. Additional grants totaled \$20,000.

Knox County received \$2,005,905 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 550 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 2,039 children, collecting \$2,148,501 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 1,963 orders.

There were 40 children cared for by foster families, 30 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$2,636.

27% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
72% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 11,026 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 49,026 of the 105,437 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 2,019 prescribers and 307 dispenser DEA numbers.
