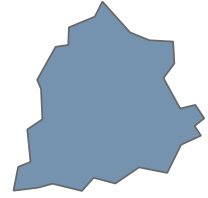

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 17 members in Laurel County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$1,055,909 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 334 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 11,104 people a month in Laurel County, stretching over 4,956 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in FY2022: \$29,633,726

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Laurel County received \$1,211,861 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 23 full-time staff and 6 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 164 children in Out of Home Care, 141 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$9,139.

25% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption.
74% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

8 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Laurel County received \$706,769 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 258 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 3,614 children a month, collecting \$4,944,913 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 112 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 19,013 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 86,196 of the 179,376 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Laurel is located in the Cumberland River Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$2,496,403 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.
