

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 1 members in Lee County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$211,479 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 65 households in the past fiscal year.

COUNTY GOVERNMENT'S SECOND SET OF HANDS

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Lee County received \$295,392 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 2 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 34 children in Out of Home Care, 27 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$2,164.

17% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 3 child(ren) adopted (YTD)
82% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Lee County received \$226,484 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 72 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 371 children a month, collecting \$382,538 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 11 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 2,120 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 12,879 of the 25,302 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 789 prescribers and 159 dispenser DEA numbers.
