


Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 2 members in Letcher County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$431,642 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 156 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 5,204 people a month in Letcher County, stretching over 2,526 households.

Kentucky Prescription Assistance Program (KPAP)

The KPAP helped 207 patients in Kentucky with 636 prescriptions to save a total of \$2,453,352 in prescription costs.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Letcher County received \$493,080 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$209,910. Additional grants totaled \$0. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Letcher County received \$4,486 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 12 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 1,281 children, collecting \$2,016,614 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 1,333 orders.

There were 21 children cared for by foster families, 21 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$1,187.

27% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 61% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 6,537 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analysesics accounted for 35,718 of the 72,911 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,336 prescribers and 248 dispenser DEA numbers.
