Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 4 members in Lincoln County.

### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

### Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Lincoln County received \$533,537 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 6 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 58 children in Out of Home Care, 51 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$4,165.

20% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 79% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Lincoln County received \$480,370 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 139 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 1,217 children a month, collecting \$1,835,411 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 49 orders.

### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 6,838 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 24,447 of the 52,552 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.
