

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 22 members in Madison County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$917,863 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 297 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 9,461 people a month in Madison County, stretching over 4,600 households.

Funding to the Madison County Health Department: \$3,404,933

The Kentucky Prescription Assistance Program assisted 86 patient(s) with 220 prescriptions and the amount of money saved in prescription costs was \$823,588 in Madison County.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Madison County received \$2,572,850 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 16 full-time staff and 4 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 211 children in Out of Home Care, 182 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$14,786.

42% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 57% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

18 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Madison County received \$4,414,800 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 1,089 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 3,920 children a month, collecting \$6,077,434 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 192 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 24,382 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 81,466 of the 189,141 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 3,624 prescribers and 581 dispenser DEA numbers.
