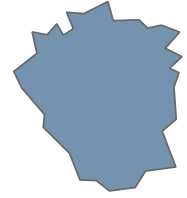

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 22 members in Madison County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$1,195,114 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 338 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 10,610 people a month in Madison County, stretching over 5,125 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2024: \$21,925,699

During fiscal year 2024, in Madison county there were 45 people enrolled in Quit Now Kentucky (no-cost tobacco quitline), QUIT Now Kentucky provided 3,947 coaching sessions across the Commonwealth.



Your county has 2,400 participants who received benefits totaling \$2,185,616.

There are 6 WIC-approved grocers in Madison County.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Madison County received \$1,086,229 in funding for 1 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 12,263, and 55% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$906,039. Additional grants totaled \$191,287.

Madison County received \$8,053,245 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 1,516 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 3,648 children, collecting \$6,624,579 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 3,617 orders.

There were 209 children cared for by foster families, 154 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$11,621.

41% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
58% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 26,529 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 80,380 of the 198,492 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 4,017 prescribers and 595 dispenser DEA numbers.
