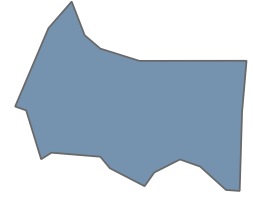

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 0 members in Marion County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$180,900 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 58 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 2,404 people a month in Marion County, stretching over 1,136 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2024: \$4,778,158

During fiscal year 2024, in Marion county there were 7 people enrolled in Quit Now Kentucky (no-cost tobacco quitline), QUIT Now Kentucky provided 3,947 coaching sessions across the Commonwealth.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Marion County received \$339,672 in funding for 1 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 3,143, and 60% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$159,959. Additional grants totaled \$500.

Marion County received \$477,166 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 154 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 763 children, collecting \$1,491,319 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 693 orders.

There were 18 children cared for by foster families, 16 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$1,508.

44% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
55% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

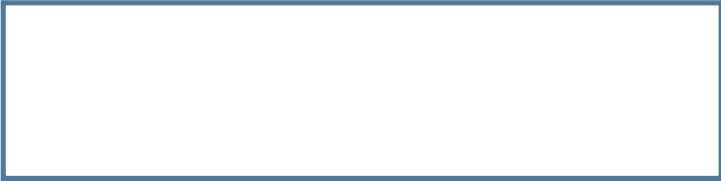

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 4,685 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 14,990 of the 33,830 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,525 prescribers and 214 dispenser DEA numbers.
