Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Martin County received \$634,014 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 7 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 15 children in Out of Home Care, 12 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of 607.

33% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 66% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

5 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Martin County received \$1,666 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 2 providers a month. The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 741 children a month, collecting \$830,900 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 25 orders.
