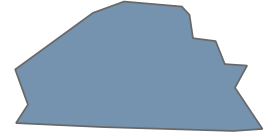

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$121,889 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 36 households in the past fiscal year.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Monroe County received \$408,765 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 4 full-time staff and 3 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 22 children in Out of Home Care, 20 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$1,292.

22% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption.
77% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

3 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Monroe County received \$137,100 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 61 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 585 children a month, collecting \$774,345 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 27 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 2,966 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 10,967 of the 23,882 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 812 prescribers and 132 dispenser DEA numbers.

Syringe Services Programs

Monroe County is served by the Lifeskills Community Mental Health Center. Lifeskills received \$10,360,488 in FY 2022.

Lifeskills served 8,702 individuals in their region.



Monroe is located in the Lifeskills Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$1,172,368 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.
