


# **Monroe County - Fiscal Year 2023**

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 1 members in Monroe County.

#### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$105,767 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 42 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 1,926 people a month in Monroe County, stretching over 863 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$3,651,178

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Monroe County received \$228,270 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$34,000. Additional grants totaled \$150,000. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Monroe County received \$14,337 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 34 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 560 children, collecting \$752,302 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 495 orders.

There were 22 children cared for by foster families, 20 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$1,309.

4% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.

95% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 2,919 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 10,752 of the 23,401 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 853 prescribers and 125 dispenser DEA numbers.

Monroe County is served by the Lifeskills Community Mental Health Center. Lifeskills received \$9,671,997 in fiscal year 2023.

Lifeskills served 8,568 individuals in their region in fiscal year 2023.



Monroe is located in the Lifeskills region. This region received \$1,112,084 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for fiscal year 2023.

#### **Public Protection Services**

The Office of the Ombudsman responded to 175 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2023 in your county.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
