Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 17 members in Pike County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$735,275 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 239 households in the past fiscal year.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Pike County received \$1,791,316 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 19 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 144 children in Out of Home Care, 134 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$7,729.

55% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 44% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

11 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Pike County received \$612,870 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 243 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 3,171 children a month, collecting \$4,208,822 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 113 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 17,640 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 97,908 of the 197,532 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 2,405 prescribers and 387 dispenser DEA numbers.
