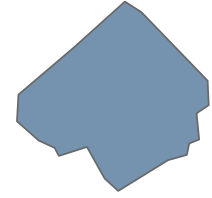

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 5 members in Pulaski County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$998,647 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 328 households in the past fiscal year.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Pulaski County received \$1,242,189 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 21 full-time staff and 2 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 108 children in Out of Home Care, 83 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$6,309.

17% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption.
82% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

17 child(ren) adopted (YTD)

Pulaski County received \$3,669,349 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 836 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 3,535 children a month, collecting \$4,818,794 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 185 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 18,990 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 63,903 of the 148,172 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 3,219 prescribers and 475 dispenser DEA numbers.
