

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 8 members in Pulaski County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$843,617 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 346 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 10,913 people a month in Pulaski County, stretching over 4,999 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$20,372,742

Kentucky Prescription Assistance Program (KPAP)

The KPAP helped 41 patients in Kentucky with 113 prescriptions to save a total of \$278,007 in prescription costs.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Pulaski County received \$1,159,620 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$126,824. Additional grants totaled \$110,500. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Pulaski County received \$401,460 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 639 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 3,425 children, collecting \$4,396,140 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 3,520 orders.

There were 120 children cared for by foster families, 83 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$9,188.

23% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 76% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 19,571 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 64,713 of the 152,540 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 3,279 prescribers and 482 dispenser DEA numbers.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
