


# **Todd County - Fiscal Year 2022**

Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$80,812 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 23 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 3,913 people a month in Todd County, stretching over 1,849 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in FY2022: \$10,422,479

The Kentucky Prescription Assistance Program assisted 5 patient(s) with 13 prescriptions and the amount of money saved in prescription costs was \$33,182 in Todd County.

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Todd County received \$246,558 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 4 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 41 children in Out of Home Care, 36 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$1,693.

17% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 82% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Todd County received \$192,437 from the Child Care
Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 61 providers
a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 621 children a month, collecting \$1,063,600 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 38 orders.

## Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 2,971 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 8,356 of the 21,729 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,051 prescribers and 130 dispenser DEA numbers.

Todd County is served by the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center. Pennyroyal received \$5,713,393 in FY 2022.

Pennyroyal served 8,694 individuals in their region.



Todd is located in the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$890,663 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.

### **Public Protection**

The Office of the Ombudsman and Administrative Review office had 202 constituent contacts in FY2022 in your county.

Office of Inspector General completed 25,705 background checks for children & elderly services throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
