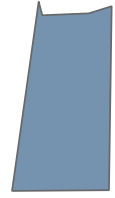

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$69,721 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 25 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 1,495 people a month in Todd County, stretching over 638 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$2,838,879

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Todd County received \$189,000 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$31,400. Additional grants totaled \$2,000. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Todd County received \$20,244 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 42 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 563 children, collecting \$976,221 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 533 orders.

There were 20 children cared for by foster families, 13 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$500.

60% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
40% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 3,000 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 7,797 of the 21,288 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,070 prescribers and 140 dispenser DEA numbers.

Todd County is served by the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center. Pennyroyal received \$6,103,744 in fiscal year 2023.

Pennyroyal served 8,633 individuals in their region in fiscal year 2023.



Todd is located in the Pennyroyal region. This region received \$815,726 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for fiscal year 2023.

Public Protection Services

The Office of the Ombudsman responded to 93 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2023 in your county.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
