Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

In Trigg County, there are 1,878 children enrolled in Medicaid.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Trigg County received \$233,779 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 3 full-time staff and 1 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 39 children in Out of Home Care, 35 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$2,219.

20% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 79% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Trigg County received \$161,957 from the Child Care
Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 53 providers
a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 500 children a month, collecting \$1,042,271 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 22 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 4,138 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 11,452 of the 28,212 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,208 prescribers and 167 dispenser DEA numbers.

Trigg County is served by the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center. Pennyroyal received \$5,713,393 in FY 2022.

Pennyroyal served 8,694 individuals in their region.



Trigg is located in the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center region. This region received \$890,663 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for FY 2022.
