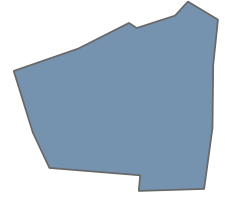

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 688 AmeriCorps members served 750,569 hours and recruited 4,705 volunteers who provided 181,290 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$5,429,636). AmeriCorps members served 45,685 students and provided food support services to 2,609 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 1,730 individuals and collected 75,035 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$73,355 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 25 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 1,353 people a month in Trigg County, stretching over 605 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2023: \$2,495,356

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Trigg County received \$189,000 in funding. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$33,000. Additional grants totaled \$54,000. Throughout the Commonwealth 84% of all enrolled students received at least one FRYSC service. Over 26,000 caregivers participated in Grandparent/Relative Support Groups, and over 36,000 students participated in FRYSC-sponsored mentoring programs.

Trigg County received \$14,772 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 36 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 503 children, collecting \$1,041,348 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2023. The agency established 492 orders.

There were 26 children cared for by foster families, 25 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$2,115.

42% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
57% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 4,253 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 11,042 of the 28,245 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 1,244 prescribers and 179 dispenser DEA numbers.

Trigg County is served by the Pennyroyal Community Mental Health Center. Pennyroyal received \$6,103,744 in fiscal year 2023.

Pennyroyal served 8,633 individuals in their region in fiscal year 2023.



Trigg is located in the Pennyroyal region. This region received \$815,726 in Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) funding for fiscal year 2023.

Public Protection Services

The Office of the Ombudsman responded to 70 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2023 in your county.

The Office of Inspector General completed 50,778 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2023.
