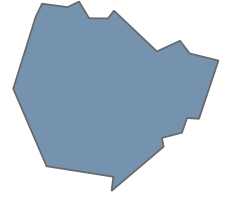

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 58 members in Warren County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$1,892,107 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 561 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 16,894 people a month in Warren County, stretching over 6,940 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2024: \$34,149,716

Funding to Barren River District Health Department:

During fiscal year 2024, in Warren county there were 52 people enrolled in Quit Now Kentucky (no-cost tobacco quitline), QUIT Now Kentucky provided 3,947 coaching sessions across the Commonwealth.



Your county has 3,396 participants who received benefits totaling \$3,292,687.

There are 14 WIC-approved grocers in Warren County.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Warren County received \$2,458,063 in funding for 2 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 22,511, and 59% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$974,909. Additional grants totaled \$2,750.

Warren County received \$4,808,837 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 1,311 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 5,558 children, collecting \$9,560,684 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 4,914 orders.

There were 376 children cared for by foster families, 289 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$29,132.

30% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
69% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 32,539 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 78,331 of the 205,303 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 3,869 prescribers and 504 dispenser DEA numbers.
