Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 3 members in Wolfe County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county has received \$258,231 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 69 households in the past fiscal year.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC in Wolfe County received \$388,201 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 4 full-time staff and 0 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 24 children in Out of Home Care, 24 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$1,378.

16% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 83% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Wolfe County received \$125,422 from the Child Care
Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 47 providers
a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served on average 788 children a month, collecting \$929,141 in current and past due child support during FY 2022. They established 29 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 2,220 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 11,067 of the 22,561 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 876 prescribers and 159 dispenser DEA numbers.
