Across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky 3,729 Serve Kentucky volunteers provided 792,753 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$1,032,063) in a little over a year between August 2020 and August 2021.

AmeriCorps members served 41,112 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 2,073 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 640 members in Kentucky.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Kentucky has received \$52,051,108 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 16,413 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 541,474 people a month in Kentucky, stretching over 251,239 households. Total SNAP spending in Kentucky in FY2022: \$1,460,041,900

The Kentucky Prescription Assistance Program assisted 4,358 patient(s) with 18,298 prescriptions and the amount of money saved in prescription costs was \$46,326,376.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

FRYSC received \$98,482,464 in funding, grants, community cash, and in-kind contributions with 1,030 full-time staff and 155 part-time staff.

As of 7/3/2022, there were 8,684 children in Out of Home Care, 7,247 of which received a per-diem, for a daily per-diem of \$555,505.

33% of children in the state's care had a goal of adoption. 66% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

585 children adopted (YTD)

Kentucky received \$127,358,194 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 33,088 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 231,072 children collecting \$347,463,741 in current and past due child support during FY2022. They established 9,137 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 1,213,731 unique patients residing in Kentucky received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 3,902,158 of the 9,209,967 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of Kentucky received these prescriptions from 221,580 prescribers and 31,701 dispenser DEA numbers.
